

upon the Deck; In the Cabin, which began immediately after Johnson's and Birch enter'd the Cabin, the Captain was soon assisted by a Gentleman Passenger who lay in the Mate's Bed; by whose Help the two Murderers were at last overpowered and secured till Morning, when the Captain pur'd them out, paid the long Loon, with a Supply of Biscuit and Water, a Compass and two Oars. After they were on board the Boat, he likewise obliged another of the Men (John Grub) to accompany them. The Captain discover'd that this Man knew of the Sword's having been taken from the Cabin and brought upon Deck, and from that and several other Circumstances, had Reason to conclude he was privy to the whole Conspiracy.

The Weather proved favourable for many Days afterwards, so that it is probable the People have been taken up by some Vessel, or got to Madeira, except Johnson, who was thought to be mortally wounded.

There was no other Reason to suspect Denny (the Man at Helm when the Murder was committed) to be concern'd in the Plot, but only that he did nothing to alarm the Captain, gave him no Assistance, nor could give a satisfactory Account of his Conduct, when he was tax'd with it. He seemed continually troubled and uneasy, and in a few Days after was taken ill and died the same Day, so that there is now no Witness of the Murder. There was then only the Captain the Passenger and a Boy to navigate the Vessel, but on the 27th January, Lat. 31° Long. 51° spoke the Ship St. Domingo, Captain Stevenon of Liverpool, bound to Cape Fear; (all well) who supplied him with a Hand. And on the 19th Instant spoke the Betsy Capt. Lightburn, of this Port, 5 Leagues distant, all well.

On Monday Morning, between three and four o'clock, a Fire was discovered breaking out at a Stable of Mr. Stevens Robinson, almost adjoining to the Kitchen belonging to the Post-Lodge in Stone-street. The Fire was got to a considerable height, and it was difficult to extinguish it, and it was directed to the Captain of the Watch, what it is said was found fast asleep; however it is certain that the People were remarkably slow in assembling, and that the Flames were almost at full height before a Bell began to ring. A great Number of adjacent Houses took Fire before any Precaution could be taken for their Security, and there was the greatest Danger of the Destruction of that whole Quarter of the Town. But at last a sufficient Number assembled and exerted themselves to effectually stop the flames, which were supprest and extinguished. It began to rain, and several other Houses were much damaged. A considerable Number of the Officers of the Army, and Soldiers assembled, and were singularly useful, not only in suppressing the Flame, but in generously affording to secure the Property of the Persons whose Houses were in Danger.
